

GOONS KILLED CHANDRA

- Top investigator's SHOCKING CHARGE



downstairs to the front of the building, then lost it.

Van Praagh, author of three best-sellers, including the blockbuster *Talking to Heaven*, gave details of his psychic hunt for Chandra on the Fox News Channel's *Judith Regan Tonight* show.

"She is dead," Van Praagh told Regan. "She was strangled...by two men. There were three all together. One was the driver and very different from the other two."

According to Van Praagh, he and his team of psychics agreed on several key points, including that Chandra sealed her fate when she told Condit she was pregnant.

"All of us think she was pregnant, that she was strangled and that she knew the person she was planning on meeting with," he reveals. "All of us said that two men were involved here."

Her body was dumped on a dairy farm near Fayetteville, Pa., says Praagh.

As for Condit, the psychic says, "I think he is guilty."

Here are Van Praagh's stunning findings, from the *Regan* show transcript.

Q: Is Chandra dead or alive?

Van Praagh: She is dead. She was strangled. She was

strangled by two men. There were three all together. One was the driver.

The famous seer says he believes that Chandra had gotten pregnant by Condit and her situation was causing problems for the congressman. She wanted more from him, financially or emotionally.

The California representative didn't want the scandal to explode like former President Clinton's problems with Monica Lewinsky did, says Van Praagh.

He was being pressured by political cronies and felt that something had to be done—although he was not necessarily involved in the action.

Q: You don't think he was present, but you think that he was involved in maybe working with these men?

Van Praagh: Someone on his staff came to him and said, 'We will take care of this, don't worry.' He just said, 'I don't want to know about it.' And he doesn't know about it. He knows that something happened.

Van Praagh says Chandra's murder happened on the night of May 1, the last day she was seen. Someone in Condit's office called her

and, believing she was going to go back to the congressman's office, she got into a black SUV with a blue interior. There was a violent struggle. He believes Chandra was wearing a gold bracelet at the time.

Q: Were the two men strangers?

Van Praagh: They were henchmen. I think that someone on his staff contacted these people. I don't think they were professionals because professionals usually shoot someone. They strangled her. I also think she was using her nails in the struggle. And I think that if they find her there will be some DNA under her nails. I think that she was in the back seat of the car.

Van Praagh has impressed thousands of people with his ability to somehow sense events surrounding death. And in Chandra's case, he believes her body is in a field, close to a farm house. Cows are close by and the soil is rich and black. A ruined

turned into a scowl and his eyes blazed with anger.

"He grabbed my arms really hard and shoved me into his staff member, Mike Lynch, saying, 'Here, Mike, you take care of Donna Crowder.' I still remember the nasty way he said my name."

Steve Wilson, who entered the 2000 race for the seat the congressman has held since 1989, also ran afoul of Condit.

"I won the primary without spending any money or time campaigning," explains Wilson, 42. "That's when my problems started."

Wilson's gun store was raided by a SWAT team from the California Department of Justice, which took away some of his merchandise. "A year later, we went to court and no charges were

filed against me," says Wilson. "I got everything back that the SWAT team took. The D.A. said there was no legal precedent for what they did to me."

Meanwhile, Modesto UPS worker Jeff Hoselton tells GLOBE he once told Condit at a rally that he felt he should support the right to bear arms. "In one second, his smile turned into an ugly scowl and his face turned red with anger," says Hoselton, 36. "'Don't you dare question my views,' he said, inching toward me like a thug looking for a fight. All I did was voice my views."

Now, Modesto resident Jeri Marshall has launched a campaign to force Condit to resign. "Gary Condit's actions and temper," she says, "just can't be trusted." —ROBIN MIZRAHI
