# John Ritter TO BLAME FOR HIS OWN DEATH

## Using fake name caused confusion about diagnosis

- HOSPITAL CLAIMS

**J**OHN RITTER may have been responsible for his own death - because he used an alias when he was admitted to the hospital on the day he died.

That's the shocking allegation defense attorneys are planning to use against John's widow Amy Yasbeck, who is suing two doctors she blames for the beloved actor's death, a source close to the case told *The ENQUIRER*. She's asking for \$67 million.

According to the source, when John first arrived at Providence Saint Joseph Medical Center in Burbank, Calif., on Sept. 11, 2003, the first doctor he saw took handwritten notes of his symptoms, and put them under the name "John Ritter."

But John then told a nurse he wanted to be registered under the alias "Edwin Marcus" to protect his privacy.

Amy's lawyers claim the hospital cardiologist, Dr. Joseph Lee, treated John for a heart attack when he was actually suffering from an aortic dissection, a tear in the largest blood vessel in the body. Had he obtained an X-ray, they say, John's true condition would have been diagnosed in time for a life-saving procedure.

Lee asked to see an X-ray but was told that none had been

taken, said the source. It's now believed that a chest X-ray WAS ordered, but was never carried out due to confusion centering on which name John was registered under.

By then, John's symptoms had become acute, and Dr. Lee then acted in accordance with what is

90 percent of the time the correct diagnosis - a mild heart attack - instead of an aortic condition.

Defense attorneys are now saying a clerical error caused by John's use of an alias caused the

request of an X-ray to fall through the cracks, the source says.

That error may have prevented a proper diagnosis, defense attorneys are expected to argue.
