Dr. John Thomas, head of family practice at Pacific Hospital in Long Beach, Calif. – who has not treated Katharine – explained how bulimia can result in long-term damage to the voice.

"If you vomit a great deal, you can cause reflux of acid up into the esophagus, which then can be aspirated into the airways, affecting the vocal cords," said Dr. Thomas.

"There definitely can be a link between bulimia and alteration of voice quality, and even possibly loss of voice."

Katharine admitted that at one

point, she would binge on food then force herself to vomit up to seven times a day.

But when she decided to compete on the fifth season of "American Idol," she knew she had to get a handle on her illness. With the support of her parents and actor boyfriend Nick Cokas, Katharine enrolled in an intensive threemonth program, where she underwent group and individual
